

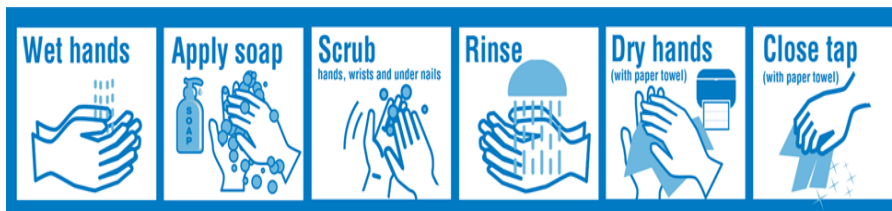
HANDWASHING

Proper Handwashing

- Always wash hands in a hand sink
- Rinse hands under running clean warm water
- Apply soap and rub hands together vigorously for at least 20 seconds
- Thoroughly rinse hands under running clean warm water
- Dry hands using paper towels or a heated air drying device
- To avoid recontamination, turn water off using a paper towel

Wash Hands:

- After touching bare skin, hair, or clothing
- After using the toilet
- After caring for or handling service animals
- After coughing, sneezing, using a handkerchief or disposable tissue
- After using tobacco, eating, or drinking
- After handling soiled equipment or utensils
- During food preparation, as often as is necessary to remove soil and contamination and to prevent cross-contamination when switching tasks
- Switching between working with raw food and working with ready-to-eat food
- Before putting on gloves for working with food
- After engaging in other activities that contaminate hands



Always use a hand sink when washing hands.
Wet your hands with clean, running water and apply soap.

Scrub your hands for at least 20 seconds. Be sure to scrub the backs of your hands, between your fingers, and under your nails. Need a timer? Hum the "Happy Birthday" song from beginning to end twice.

Rinse hands well under clean, warm running water.
Dry hands using a clean towel, air dry them, or use a heated air drying device. Turn water off using a paper towel.

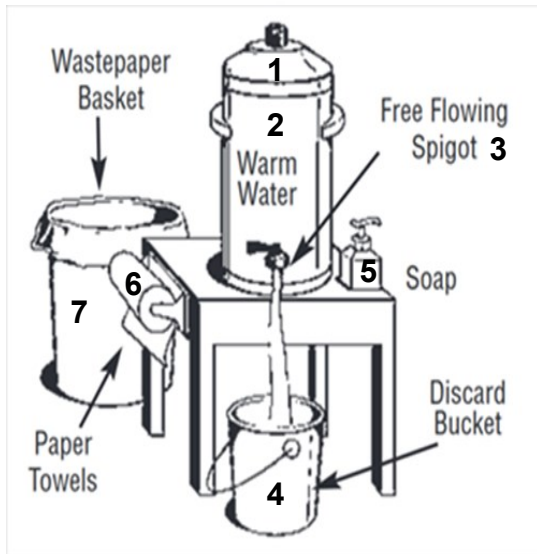

Temporary Hand Wash Set Up

Ideal Temporary Hand Washing Set Ups



- 1 - 5 Gallon Thermal container
- 2 - Warm water from approved safe source (100 °F - 120 °F)
- 3 - Continuous flow spigot
- 4 - Discard bucket/Drain
Waste water must be discarded into public sewers or approved location by regulating authority.
Discharging to the ground surface is NOT allowed.
- 5 - Soap
- 6 - Paper towels
- 7 - Trash container

Where do I place my temporary sinks?

- Wherever a sink is already present
- At hand wash sinks in kitchen and rest rooms
- At bar sinks

Types of Free Flowing Spigots:



**Any of these types of spigots are allowed.
They can be turned on, and will continue
to provide a free flow of water until turned off.**



**Push button spigots
are NOT free flow.
NOT ALLOWED.**
